Fairfax County, Virginia - Fireworks Safety

A constituent called me recently, asking what she could do locally to protect water resources. There are many non-profit organizations that focus on clean water for the globe (just search "clean water"), but our own actions here as Fairfax County residents can help ensure water quality locally. Lawn fertilizer runoff is a common pollutant in our waterways, but the Northern Virginia Regional Commission recommends that you should "fertilize in the fall, if at all." Most lawns today do not need the amounts of fertilizer so often advertised; you can take a soil sample to the master gardeners at Green Spring Gardens Park to learn more about what your lawn really needs. Avoid flushing medicines and other non-disposable items (even if they are labeled as "flushable"). Stormwater runoff catches everything in its path, taking grass clippings, leaves, plastic bottles and bags, and other trash with it, right into local water bodies. Neighborhood cleanups can help, but avoiding the pollution in the first place is the best approach. I'm sure you have many other ideas or tips that you can implement in your own household or neighborhood.

Last year at this time, Fairfax County was celebrating its 275th anniversary (yes, the county is older than the nation), with many fascinating stories and artifacts. It's never too late to document our more recent history, too. Perhaps you have memories of growing up here when Fairfax was a rural location, or maybe you remember when certain stores, now gone, were popular, or how holidays were celebrated. A constituent once told me that, when he was a boy, a tinker made his rounds along a gravelly Edsall Road in a horse-drawn wagon. (A tinker was an itinerant craftsman who mended metal utensils, like pots, knives, buckets, etc.). Capture those stories now, via digital recorder or cell phone video perhaps, before they are lost, and share them with my office if you wish. That could be a fun project with grandparents during vacation this summer!

<u>Short-Term Lodging</u> — At its <u>June 21</u> meeting, the Planning Commission, after much debate, recommended language for a proposed Zoning Ordinance Amendment that addresses short-term lodging (STL). A public hearing before the Board of Supervisors is scheduled for **Tuesday**, <u>July 10, 2018</u>, beginning at 4:30 p.m. The proposed language is available at www.fairfaxcounty.gov/planning-zoning/. To testify at the public hearing, register at www.fairfaxcounty.gov/bosclerk/speakers-form, or call 703-324-3151; TTY 711 by noon on the day of the hearing to ensure your place on the speakers list.

Land Use News – Land use items of interest include:

- The public hearing before the Board of Supervisors about the Vulcan rezoning and special exception application in the Springfield Industrial Park will be conducted on Tuesday, July 10, at 4:30 p.m., at the Fairfax County Government Center, 12000 Government Center Parkway in Fairfax. To register to speak at the public hearing, complete the registration form available at www.fairfaxcounty.gov/bosclerk/speakers-form, or call 703-324-3151; TTY 711.
- Christopher Land LLC has submitted an SE application for several properties fronting Gallows Road and Libeau Lane in Annandale, across from Woodburn Elementary School. The application proposes independent living facilities in an age-restricted housing development consisting of a mix of single family homes and townhomes. This application will go through the county's extensive public process, which includes two presentations before the Mason District Land Use Committee, a public hearing before the Planning Commission, and ultimately a public hearing before the Board of Supervisors. - Demolition continues along the southeast quadrant of Bailey's Crossroads to raze the Landmark Building at 5827 Columbia Pike. Interior demolition has been completed, and controlled asbestos abatement is nearing completion. Exterior demolition of the Landmark Building will begin in July. A protective mesh netting will be draped to contain the demolished material within the protective netting envelope. Deliberate dismantling of the steel structure will follow in mid-August, and the site will be stabilized by early fall 2018. - Northpoint Realty Partners, LLC has submitted an SE/PCA application to amend proffers and conditions associated with the approved I-4 zoning, and to permit an increase in FAR from 0.50 to 0.70 to permit a self-storage facility on a 6.04 acre property located at 6375 Bren Mar Drive. The applicant will present before the Mason District Land Use Committee on Thursday, July 24. A public hearing before the Planning Commission is scheduled for Thursday, September 20. The public hearing before the Board of Supervisors has not been scheduled.
- The Calvary Church of the Nazarene, located 8220 Little River Turnpike in Annandale has submitted an SE application for an adult day care center. The facility is proposed to be located entirely within the church's existing structure and proposes no changes or additions to the exterior of the property. This application is scheduled to come before the Mason District Land Use Committee on Tuesday, July 24, 2018, and public hearings are scheduled before the Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors on Thursday, September 13 and Tuesday, September 25, 2018, respectively.

Fairfax Water to Replace Backlick Road Water Main – In late July, Fairfax Water's contractor, Casper Colosimo and Son, Inc., will be replacing selected water mains on Backlick Road, between Jayhawk Street and Cindy Lane in Annandale. Property owners in the affected area will be notified in advance of any water service interruptions (48 hours in advance). Interruptions of water service typically last approximately 4-5 hours, and normally occur toward the end of the project once all of the water main has been installed. Traffic flow and access to residences and intersecting streets will be maintained on Backlick Road. When the water main replacement is completed, the road will be repaved by the contractor in accordance with the Virginia Department of Transportation's requirements.
