

The mention of winter evokes images of sparkling snowflakes and skaters gracefully gliding across the ice, though heavy snowfall and extreme cold can immobilize an entire region. Even areas that normally experience mild winters can be hit with a major snowstorm or extreme cold. Winter storms can result in flooding, storm surge, closed highways, blocked roads, downed power lines and hypothermia.

The editors of the Leewood Times have put together a guide to help you have a healthy and happy winter. Helpful household tips can help you save on energy costs this season, and the section on driving in the snow can help you and your family be safe. Here is an excerpt from the guide.

If you are outdoors:



Avoid overexertion when shoveling snow. Overexertion can bring on a heart attack. If you must shovel snow, stretch before going outside. Cover your mouth. Protect your lungs from extremely cold air by covering your mouth when outdoors. Keep dry. Change wet clothing frequently to prevent a loss of body heat. Wet clothing loses all of its insulating value and transmits heat rapidly. Watch for signs of frostbite. These include loss of feeling and white or pale appearance in extremities such as fingers, toes, ear lobes, and the tip of the nose. If symptoms are detected, get medical help immediately. Watch for signs of hypothermia. These include uncontrollable shivering, memory loss, disorientation, incoherence, slurred speech, drowsiness, and apparent exhaustion.

If symptoms of hypothermia are detected:

- Get the victim to a warm location
- Remove wet clothing
- Put the person in dry clothing and wrap their entire body in a blanket
- Warm the center of the body first
- Give warm, non-alcoholic or non-caffeinated beverages if the victim is conscious
- Get medical help as soon as possible.

Area High School Voted Best in the Country

In its first-ever ranking of "America's Best High schools," U.S. News & World Report ranks Fairfax County's Thomas Jefferson High School for Science and Technology as the top high school in the United States. Thomas Jefferson High School draws applicants from across five counties and two cities in Northern Virginia, selecting 500 students from a pool of several thousand applicants. Admission is based primarily on a general achievement test and prior grades. Of the 432 seniors in the Class of 2007, 158 were National Merit semifinalists, more than any other school in the nation. And the average student SAT score was a 2155 (on a 2400 scale). When they aren't shouldering their science-heavy course load, TJ students participate in a slew of extracurriculars, choosing from some 25 varsity sports and 85 clubs, including the Investment Club, the Neuroscience Society, the Entomology Club, and the Forensics Sciences Society. **LEEWOOD TIMES**

NEW Hot Lanes on I-495

The Capital Beltway High Occupancy Toll (HOT) lanes project will deliver the first significant expansion to the Capital Beltway in more that 30 years. Two HOT lanes will be added in each



direction between the Springfield Interchange and just north of the Dulles Toll Road, providing motorists new choices for faster, more reliable trips. Buses and carpools with three or more people can use the lanes for free, while non-HOV motorists can choose to pay a toll and access the lanes as well. Toll prices will be based on demand. Prices will change throughout the day according to real-time traffic conditions to manage the number of cars in the HOT lanes and keep them congestion free. In September 2007 Fluor-Transurban and the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) reached an in-principle agreement for the design, construction, operations and maintenance of the Capital Beltway HOT Lanes. The agreement is currently being finalized, with final signatures and financing to be completed by the end of the year. Construction is expected to begin in spring 2008 with the lanes to be opened in 2013.

New Door Type Approved

Your LHOA has approved a new type of door for your home. *See picture to the right*. Wooden, metal or fiberglass doors are permissible. The glass should be clear, un-frosted, uncolored, un-etched, non-bevel glass without ornamentation. Brass kick plates not to exceed 6 inches in height are permitted. Doors should ideally be the same color as shutters and a different color from the trim color.
